Father Michael J McGivney:

Father McGivney's decision to dedicate his life to caring for the spiritual and material needs of those who were not begotten of his own physical family came not from some vague desire to be a do-gooder. No one who lived through so much death and sorrow at home could be driven by mere sentiment. Rather, the sorrows and struggles of his own family taught him something of the eternal meaning and purpose of a single human life. And he learned, as well, about the equation of love: how that in giving to the beloved we are most united and fulfilled in our humanity.

Father McGivney possessed that gift, shared by many holy men and women, to see in each person the face of Christ, most especially in the poor, the abandoned and those beleaguered in spirit. There was a special affinity between the gentle priest and those to whom life had dealt a difficult hand. He was never ill at ease with the poorest parishioner and he always felt camaraderie with the ordinary laborer. They, in turn, sensed this spiritual bond emanating from him.

The Knights of Columbus was, for Father McGivney, a means to an end. The goal was the strengthening of the family and the building up of the Church and the wider society in which the Knights lived. It was a vision of astonishing breadth for one so young and relatively inexperienced in the ways of the world. Yet, as God's servant, he accomplished the task set out for him. He was a preacher of the Gospel of Life.

Supreme News:

A fully-equipped prosthetics and rehabilitation clinic established with funds provided by the Knights of Columbus was dedicated to the memory of Emilio Moure.

In the aftermath of the devastating January 2010 earthquake in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, the Knights of Columbus quickly worked with the American Wheelchair Mission to arrange a shipment of a thousand wheelchairs for Haitians who had become disabled because of injuries suffered during the quake. The initial shipment of wheelchairs was distributed at the field hospital which had been set up in Port-au-Prince by Project Medishare for Haiti. Supreme Knight Carl Anderson was impressed with the exceptional work being done by the Project Medishare volunteers, "What else can we do?" Haiti's needs are so great that it is hard to know where to begin. But Dr. Gailey, who has worked with the physically disabled throughout his professional career, suggested a plan that would quickly benefit some of the most helpless victims of the earthquake: children who had lost limbs. Moure pledged the support of the Knights for a program that would provide every child who had suffered an amputation because of the earthquake with prosthetic care over the next years. The program, "Healing Haiti's Children," commits \$1 million to providing each of the children with prosthetic limbs and a program of physical therapy as well as replacement prosthetics as the child grows.

The Knights provided funding for the construction of a complete prosthetics and orthotics facility at the Hospital Bernard Mevs Project Medishare in downtown Port-au-Prince, now the only such unit in the country.

How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns and why?

21 steps:

It alludes to the twenty-one gun salute which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.

How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why?

seconds for the same reason as answer number 1

Why are his gloves wet?

His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle.

Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all?

the time and, if not, why not?

He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

How often are the guards changed?

Guards are changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

What are the physical traits of the guard limited to?

For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5' 10" and 6' 2" tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30.

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform or the tomb in any way.

After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn. The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet.

There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt. There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror. The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone nor watch TV.

All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are:

President Taft,

Joe Lewis {the boxer}

Medal of Honor winner Audie L. Murphy, the most

decorated soldier of WWII and of Hollywood fame.

Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty...
